I would like to thank the parents who organised our two Father's Day events, being the stall at school and the Mitre 10 BBQ. Both events were very successful in raising much needed money to go towards our school programs and resources. All the maths trolleys which were purchased from funds raised by the committee with your support are in classrooms now. The existing maths equipment has been stored in the trolleys and a list of items that we still need is being compiled. It is hoped that some of these items will be purchased from fundraising that is planned for in the remainder of the year. I cannot over state how important these additional funds are to helping the school provide a better and more comprehensive educational experience for our students. THANK YOU!

### **Understanding School Fees**

I would like to thank all parents who have paid or are paying off this year's school fees. I understand that for many of our families money pressures are significant and I appreciate the efforts that so many have made. There are still some families who have to finalise payments for the year and I would ask that you contact the school if you are struggling with this.

The issue of school fees can be confusing and contentious at time. Victorian legislation provides that instruction in the standard curriculum program must be provided free to all students in Victorian government schools. Free instruction includes the provision of learning and teaching activities, instructional supports, materials and resources, and administration and facilities associated with the <u>standard</u> curriculum program.

With this legislation in place many parents question why government schools charge nominal fees. Critical to the government's legislation is the term 'standard curriculum'. Each year the school is funded using a formula which is calculated on a set figure per child. The funding takes into account the provision of materials and resources as well as some teachers. Other funding sources do come into the equation, such as special needs, rurality, government initiatives etc. It is quite a complex formula but at the end of the day, the funds provide exactly what they say, the ability to fund a standard curriculum. Your support via the paying of school fees and voluntary contributions is essential to help us provide our children with more than the minimum requirement by bridging the gap between funding provided by the government and funding needed to provide the level of education we believe your children need.

### **Planning Week**

Next week will see our usual end of term planning days for each grade level. This is a very important part of the planning process and ensures that the following term is up and running from day one. It is a time for all teachers to work collaboratively to look at the data from this term and map out the most productive and effective curriculum plan for the remainder of the year. All children will continue to be involved in a productive program for the week that consolidates the terms learning.

### Grade5/6 Camp

On Thursday last week I visited our student at Sovereign Hill while they were on camp. It was a great day and I came home proud as punch of our students, their behaviour and their attitude. I would like to once again thank the staff who spend hours preparing for camp and give their personal time so the camp can go ahead. A huge thanks as well to the parents who volunteer, without them the experience would not happen.

### Read for Australia – Friday 2 September 2016






Last Friday as part of Literacy & Numeracy Week the whole school participated in 'Read for Australia' Day. During session 1 students from Foundation to Grade 4 read the story 'My Two Blankets' by Irena Kobald. The story, which was the winner of Children's Book of the Year in 2015, sensitively tackles issues of fitting in, culture and migration as experienced between two young girls, one new to the culture and the other girl already established. Each girl comes to an appreciation of their own differences and this text develops empathy in readers of all ages.

After listening to the story students were engaged in a range of activities related to the themes in the story. Students responded to the story by sharing feelings and thoughts about the events and characters, some made their own blanket of pictures illustrating what makes them feel safe while other grades found key events and words from the story and retold in detail what happened.

### Our experience at the Grade 5/6 Ballarat Camp

### Day 1 – Wednesday 31<sup>st</sup> August

On Wednesday 31<sup>st</sup> August, 62 students, 5 teachers and 5 parent helpers got on our buses and started our journey towards Ballarat. We stopped at Bacchus Marsh for morning tea and got to play on a huge playground that looked like a castle. Once we had finished here we continued to Ballarat Wildlife Park where we had lunch.

At the wildlife park in the lunch eating area there were Kangaroo's and Emu's roaming around which we got to pat and take photos with. Some even tried to eat our lunches!! At the park there were other animals like wallabies, eagles, llamas and alligators. We had a chance to look around and see a show about dingoes and then a show about reptiles.

When we left the park we headed to the Big4 Goldfield Caravan Park which is where we were staying for two nights. When we were allowed we went to our cabins and had a chance to unpack and settle in before taking part in some activities. The activities were to go on the huge jumping pillow, the playground, go into the games room or boot camp activities with Miss George. Dinner that night was roast chicken with veggies followed by ice cream. After dinner we had the choice of doing activities in our cabins or watching a movie.



### Day 2 – Thursday 1<sup>st</sup> August

On Thursday we had to wake up and get ready early. Breakfast was at 7am! We left the caravan park and headed to Sovereign Hill for the day. We walked around Sovereign Hill in our group and got to see and do lots of things. Most of us went to the lolly shop first and bought lots of lollies! There was a grocery store next door that sold giant freckles! After the lolly shop we walked along Main Street and had a look in some of the other shops then went to the church and the candle makers. We got to make our own candles by dipping the candles into three different coloured dyes. There was pink, blue and yellow. We got to see how people used to go bowling in the 1800's, see old fire trucks, watch the old horse and carriages move around and see lots of people walking around in old fashioned costumes. We were very lucky to get to go gold panning in the stream to see if we could find gold and go down deep into the Red Hill Mine where we learnt how the miners used to mine for gold. We were also lucky enough at Sovereign Hill to get to an education session where some of our students got to dress up in old clothes and we got to watch the gold pour demonstration where they melted gold and put it into a mould to make a gold bar.









We only had a very short time after Sovereign Hill for dinner (lasagne, yum!) because we had to head back to see the Blood on the Southern Cross light show. The show started in a cinema where we saw a short movie and then we moved on outside to the gold panning creek. Here we listened to people re-enacting events from history and we watched the tents light up and the campfires come on. We then, got to get onto some open buses which took us up the back of Sovereign Hill and into another theatre area where there was a mini Bakers Hill built and we got to watch and listen to the story of the Eureka Stockade. After the amazing light show we headed back to our cabins and most of us fell asleep straight away. We were so tired!

### Day 3 – Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> September

On our last day we packed our stuff up and loaded it into the bus and off we went. We started the day at the Museum of Australian Democracy at Eureka (M.A.D.E). When we got there we had a short talk about the museum and then got split into five different groups where we went to do different activities. We got to do some research out Eureka, learn about the weapons they used to use, and see the original Eureka flag which was huge but had a lot missing from when people used to rip parts off. After the museum we were off back to Bacchus Marsh for lunch and some time on the playground before the teacher handed out some awards and prizes and then we left and arrived back at school. This was the end of our fantastic trip to Ballarat!!


From swimming to swapping **books**, it's all happening at KPS.

### Social Media & Your School

Be a positive role model by demonstrating respectful and responsible behaviours when communicating with and about your child's school online.

### Times have changed


A few years ago parents discussed concerns or issues with friends at the school gate. Today, with the internet, mobile phones and social media, discussions between you and your friends can reach a far wider audience than ever before.

Social media can provide an enjoyable way to socialise online and keep you connected with what is going on in your school community.

While these technologies can be great for sharing ideas and keeping in touch, don't forget that comments about your school community can have greater impact than expected and can have very real consequences for the reputations of individuals including teachers, principals, other parents, students and yourself.

As a parent and carer, you are your child's first role model when it comes to online behaviour. Make sure your online conduct demonstrates how they can use social media respectfully and safely.

There are also legal implications around what people are able post and share about others. The idea of privacy in the online world can be confusing but essentially posting or sharing personal information about another person online requires consent.




Avoid posting negative comments that identify your school or individuals.

Feedback from the school community is important for schools and the department. Each Victorian Government school has a complaints process for raising concerns. If you have a concern, rather than go online, speak directly to your child's teacher, Assistant Principal or Principal.

If after having this conversation you feel that your concerns have not been resolved, you can contact the Community Liaison Officer at your closest Department of Education and Training Regional Office, who will assist you and the school to find a solution. Remember: serious instances of inappropriate online behavior may constitute a criminal offence and become a police matter. School staff may obtain personal legal advice if they feel that online content seriously impacts their reputation.



### Social Media & Your School

Try not to be emotive or hasty. Keep comments calm and polite.

Before you post something online about your child's school ask yourself:

- Am I being a good role model for my child?
- Will this information reflect badly on me?
- Does the school community or individual really need to know this information?
- Is this information relevant, helpful and positive?
- Will this information upset or embarrass the school community or an individual?
- Am I making situation worse?

If things do get heated online consider logging out and taking time to relax.



Be aware of what you are sharing and with whom.

Remember that the legal implications around sharing personal information applies to images and video presented online.

As the parent/carer of your child, you have the right to choose who sees your child's personal information, including their image online. You also have a responsibility to not share the personal details of other children.

If you upload photos on social media of school events, be aware of who is in the background. Some parents and caregivers do not want themselves or their children on social media. It is recommended that you never tag a child's image with any personal information.

If your child's personal information or image has been shared on social media without your consent you can request its removal by the social network hosting it.

All Victorian Government schools have a policy on if and when it is appropriate to use cameras for filming or photographing school events. You can contact your child's school for more information.

If you share pictures of your children publicly through online photo-sharing sites and hashtags, remember that once it is shared, you have no control over how it is used or by whom. To avoid these photos being shared by others or used for purposes without your consent, make sure you set up your account security settings to share images

only with close family and friends.



### Social Media & Your School

### Get to know social media.

It may be helpful to research online networks and mobile applications. In particular look at:

- Terms of Use
- Policies and procedures for the removal of content
- Privacy settings

### Be proactive.

If you see something you feel should be removed, flag it. Some sites will allow you to do this anonymously.

### Address inappropriate content.

If you encounter inappropriate content online, there are a number of steps you can take:

- Refrain from responding.
- Take a screen capture or print a copy of the concerning online content.
- If you think the content is explicit, pornographic or exploitative of minors, contact the eSafety Commission <a href="https://esafety.gov.au/complaints-and-reporting">https://esafety.gov.au/complaints-and-reporting</a>
- Block the offending user.
- If the inappropriate or negative comments are in regards to your child's school or members of the school community you should also contact the school Principal.
- Report the content to the social media provider (e.g. Facebook). Providers can remove content that contravenes their Terms of Use.

### **KPS BYO iPad Program**

Dear Parents/Guardians.

Kilmore Primary School will continue to offer a 'Bring Your Own iPad' program in 2017 for students in Grades 3-6. You will shortly receive a pack where there are a number of documents to familiarise yourself with before making a decision of whether you would like to partake in the program.

### **Information Sessions**

We will be offering information sessions to help you make an informed decision. For your convenience we will run two sessions, so you can select the most convenient time for you:

Wednesday the 12<sup>th</sup> of October at 7pm, in the ICT room

Or

Friday the 14<sup>th</sup> of October at 9am, in the ICT room

At these sessions, we will discuss the program and what parents will need to do prior to their child's involvement. Students will not be able to be part of the 1:1 BYO iPad program without returning the applicable forms and meeting the 'Mandatory Requirements' from the booklet.

All forms can be returned to the school in 2016, to begin the administration process to ensure that your child is connected to the school network at the start of next year. Once you have indicated that you would like to be part of the program, an 'App List' will be provided to you, so that you can prepare the iPad for student use. There will be a 'setup day' in the 2<sup>nd</sup> week of school in 2017, where students will bring their iPad (which is ready to use) for the school technician and myself to connect to the school network. This specific date will be communicated to parents at a later time.

The school will also be aiming to utilize Office 365 with all students at the school (regardless of whether they take up the 1:1 BYO iPad program) as Office can be used in conjunction with class sets of iPads. There is an attached consent form (Appendix B) written by the Department of Education that will need to be signed and returned to the school. Without consent students will not be able to use Office 365. In the consent form you may notice there are a variety of programs that Office 365 gives students possible access to, however, the school will only be making use of: One Drive for Business, Office Web Apps and Share Point Online. **To be involved in the BYO iPad program, students need to return this form.**
