Cyber Safety Warning

I have been advised that many of the older kids at KPS use the Kik instant messenger system as their main social media platform. Please note the following: The Kik app has recently been updated and now has some <u>undesirable features</u>, in particular a much more limited ability to block unknown people, and new features that allow kids to easily search for images and videos without using a Web browser. Because of the update, Kik is increasingly being used by potential predators to contact children, with many sending inappropriate images. Also, there are now links within Kik, which are going to be actively promoted to other Apps that are targeted towards adult use, (e.g. an adult "Chat with a stranger" App). Because of the changes, the App, which used to be rated 13+, is now rated 17+.

Head Lice

From time to time, all schools have outbreaks of head lice in their student population. The good old 'nit nurses' no longer come to the schools for inspections, so we have to rely on visual inspections. You can assist by regularly checking your children's hair for signs of nits (lice eggs).

We have included an information sheet in the newsletter that gives you the process that must be followed if your child has nits. To ensure complete eradication of the lice and eggs, proper treatments from the chemist or council must be used on your children's hair, and all bedding and clothing must be washed carefully. If you have any concerns or questions, please contact the school or the local council for more information.

Education Maintenance Allowance (EMA)

EMA provides financial assistance to families on a low income to help with the cost of essential educational items such as stationery, uniforms, camps & excursions.

EMA is a means-tested payment - parents must hold a Centrelink/Veterans Affairs concession card to be eligible.

An EMA application form can be collected from the office and must be completed by eligible parents/ guardians and submitted annually to schools.

A separate application is required for each school if you have children attending different schools.

If you received an EMA payment for Semester 1 then your application for Semester 2 will be processed by the school on your behalf.

If you have transferred your child to Kilmore Primary School, you will need to make a new application at our school.

The application form must be lodged at the school by **1st August 2014** for the second instalment.

Treating and controlling headlice

While children are at school many families will have contact with head lice. The information of will help you treat and control head lice.

Catching head lice

Head lice have been around for many thousands of years. Anyone can get head lice

Head lice are small, wingless, blood sucking insects. Their colour varies from whitish-brown to reddish-brow Head lice only survive on humans. If isolated from the head they die very quickly (usually within 24 hours). People get head lice from direct hair to hair contact with nother person who has head lice. This can happen when people play, cuddle or work closely together

Head lice do not have wings or jumping legs so the cannot fly or jump from head to head. They can only crawl.

Finding head lice Many lice do not cause an itch, so you have to look carefully to find them.

Head lice are found on the hair itself and move to the scalo to feed. They have six legs which end in a claw and they rarely fall from the head. Louse eggs (also called hits) are laid within 1.5 cm of the scalp and are firmly attached to the hair. They resemble dandruff, but can't be brushed off.

Lice can crawl and hide. The easiest and most effective way to find them is to follow these steps:

Step 1 Comb any type of hair conditioner on to dry, brushed (detangled) hair. This stuns the lice and makes it difficult for them to grip the hair or crawl around.

- p 2 Now comb sections of the hair with a fine tooth, head lice comb
- Step 3 Wipe the conditioner from the comb onto a paper towel or tissue
- Step 4 Look on the tissue and on the comb for ice and eggs. Step 5 Repeat the combing for every part of the

If lice or eggs are found, the hair should be treated If the person has been treated recently and you only find empty hatched eggs, you may not have to treat, as the empty eggs could be from a previous episode.

Treating head lice

- Treating head lice involves removing lice and eggs from the hair. There are two ways you can do this:
- Buying and using a head lice lotion or shampoo, following the instructions on the product 2. Using the conditioner and comb method (described
- under 'finding head lice') every second day until there have been no live lice found for ten days

If you choose to use a head lice product always follow the instructions provided with the product carefully. The following points may also be helpful:

- · Head lice products must be applied to all parts of the hair and scalp.
- No treatment kills all of the eggs so treatment must involve two applications, seven days part. The first treatment kills all lice; the second treatment kills the lice that may have hatched from eggs not killed by the first treatment.
- · Cover the person's eyes while the treatment is being applied. A towel is a good way to do this.If you are using a lotion, apply the product to dry hair
- · If you are using a shampoo, wet the hair, but use the least amount of water possible.
- Apply the treatment near the scalp, using an ordinar comb to cover the hair from root to tip. Repeat this several times until all the hair is covered.

There is no need to treat the whole family - unless they also have head lice.

Concentrate on the head - there is no need to clean the house or the classroom.

Testing resistance

Head lice products belong in one of the following categories depending on the active compound they conta

pyrethrins


- · synthetic pyrethroids (permethrin, bioallethrin) organophosphates (maldison or malathion)
- · herbal with or without natural (non-chemical) pyrethrins.

ecticide resistance is common, so you should test if lice are dead. If they are, treat again in seven days using the same product. If the lice are not dead, the treatment has not worked and the lice may be resistant to the product and all products containing the same active compound. Wash off the product and treat as soon as possible using a product containing a different active compound. If the insecticide has worked, the lice will be dead within 20 minutes.

Any head lice product could cause a reaction and should be ed with care by women who are pregnant or breastfeeding, children less than 12 months old and people with allergies asthma or open wounds on the scalp. If you are unsure, please check with your pharmacist or doctor.

Head lice combs

Combs with long, rounded stainless steel teeth positioned very close together have been shown to be the most effective, however, any head lice comb can be used.

Regulations

According to the Public Health and Wellbeing Regulations 2009, children with head lice can be readmitted to school or children's service centres after treatment has commenced.

The department recommends a child with head lice can be treated one evening and return to school or children's service centres the next day, even if there are still some esent. There is no need to miss school or child care because of head lice.

Preventing head lice

Check your child's head regularly with comb and conditioner. There is no r ch to prove that chemical or herbal therapies can prevent head lice.



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


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
